- Having arrived at lunchtime on 29 November at <u>Manchester Buddhist Centre</u>, we enjoyed a delicious meal in their Earth Café. Then Munisha gave us a tour of MBC, introduction to Clear Vision and the MBC's schools' service, including stilling/meditation in shrine room
- Laughter workshop was a real delight as you can tell from feedback from other delegates
- We met to discuss Federation business and plan future newsletters and meetings and then stayed overnight at <u>Britannia Manchester Hotel</u>, Portland Street, for dinner, bed and breakfast
- On 30 November, after breakfast, we visited the <u>Manchester Jewish Museum</u> which does amazing work for schools in the area.

- → extending my personal knowledge of Buddhism and Judaism
- → networking with colleagues in other resource centres
- purchasing Buddhist and Jewish resources
- → CPD laughter workshop really good for the soul.

November conference feedback: Thank you, Lydia, for making all the arrangements for what I experienced as a very satisfying and educative couple of days in Manchester. The Buddhist experience echoed my training, work and teaching as a psychotherapist and counsellor - the relaxation exercise leading into the spiritual realm. The visit to the de-consecrated Orthodox Synagogue on Wednesday was a very different occasion: it left me with a mixture of emotions like sadness that the original Synagogue members had moved too far away to be able to attend with the re-development of the area, but happiness at the achievement of the Jews in restoring the building, maintaining the fabric and providing such a superb service for local schools.

It was also good to meet colleagues from other Resource Centres and be able to put faces to names and to learn about the function of the Federation of RE Centres.

I look forward to our next conference in the Summer of 2012.

November conference feedback: Lydia put an immense amount of work into getting this year's Autumn conference off the ground. She persisted with complicated diaries and a new venue to offer a conference that was both a challenge and a delight.

It was very enjoyable having you here at the Manchester Buddhist Centre (MBC) last week, and it was clear you had a very good time too!

As promised, here are the links to our two newer sets of resources, which are online interactive video materials, not DVDs. Schools, or resources centres, buy a site licence which gives unlimited access to the materials within that institution only - for ever! You can have the materials accessible from as many computers as you like. (Karenza has these materials in her centre, so, if you like, you can ask her what she's done and how they are used.)

Within each one, you can try a free sample section. And there is a 6-minute introductory video about **Us and Them**.

- 12-16 years: **Us and Them: Buddhism and community** is our material on Buddhism and community cohesion, identity and belonging. I think it is extremely unusual and marvellous (if I do say so myself) and it has been well reviewed but not widely, despite intense efforts on my part.

- 8-14 years: The Life of the Buddha interactive tells the Buddha's life story using the
 illustrated sections which are also found within the Living Buddhism DVD for KS3, but
 with additional material including new material on the Dharma, to make it a full resource
 in itself, for schools who are doing Buddhism in less depth, or under the theme of Leaders
 or Heroes etc.

Nottingham RSResource Centre

The RS Resource Centre in Nottingham is adapting to changing financial situations. The Centre lost all funding for its work from the Local Educational Authorities, this has meant that a new evolving relationship is developing with the Nottingham Inter Faith Council as we no longer can fund the Council for assistance in the Centre one day a week. Since his early retirement from teaching, Ken is working on behalf of the Centre on a voluntary basis. The management Committee has been very grateful to the Bluecoat Academy which is continuing to host the Centre on its premises.

Our Faith Experiences continue to develop and we are reaching into new schools as well as revisiting some. We are offering our work now into neighbouring counties as this maybe the future of the Centre and its work to assist in developing good Religious Education. The Centre is reviewing its operations during the next few months as well as seeking alternative funding. Here are some comments which illustrate how teachers are welcoming faiths going into schools.

Bagthorpe Primary School Sikhism for Years 3 & 4

The most valuable things were:- "the concrete learning experiences. The visual impact of the Gurdwara and seeing the actual Gurdwara in Nottingham" [on film]

Orchard Primary School Kirby in Ashfield Years 5 & 6

"This experience enables pupils to feel that they 'had been a Muslim' for an afternoon which helps to erode prejudices and pre-conceptions."
